Therefore, arrangements are to be made at least one year in advance and before any social plans are finalized.

FIRST PENANCE, FIRST EUCHARIST, CONFIRMATION: Though immediate preparation is given to children before receiving these sacraments, it is expected that children receive a Christian education within their family life, through formal religious education classes, and by attending Sunday worship services.

PASTORAL CARE OF THE SICK: Arrangements for Communion Calls to the sick at home may be made by calling the Parish Office.

PARISH REGISTRATION: Our parish welcomes new members to our faith community. Catholic persons new to our area must complete a registration form and be interviewed by the pastor. First Reading: 2 Kings 4:42-44
A man brought twenty loaves of bread to Elisha the prophet, who told his servant to distribute it to the people. The servant asked how he could offer twenty loaves to one hundred people. Elisha replied that God had said, "They shall eat and there shall be some left over." After all the people had eaten, there was bread left over as God had said.

Second Reading: Ephesians 4:1-6

First Friday Devotions August 2, 2024

The First Friday devotion is different from the First Saturday devotion, which is dedicated to the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

The First Friday devotion is a devotion to the **Sacred Heart of Jesus** that originated from the apparitions of Jesus Christ to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque in the 17th century. The devotion involves attending Mass, receiving Holy Communion, and going to Confession on the First Friday of the month for 9 consecutive months. It is a way of showing Love, Penance, and Reparation to Jesus for our sins. Jesus promised to those who practice this devotion the grace of final repentance and a secure refuge in His Heart at the hour of death Heart at the hour of death.

In honor of the Blessed Mother's request to Sr. Lucia, whom she appeared to at Fatima, St. Mary of Czestochowa offers the opportunity to partake in the devotion of the Five First Saturdays.

On the first Saturday of each month, the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass is offered at 8:30 am, followed by the recitation of the rosary and 15 minutes of quiet meditation on the mysteries. The intention of this devotion is to make reparation for the offenses and blasphemies against the Immaculate Heart of Mary. Confession, which is a requirement, may be made within 8 days prior or after the first Saturday. The promise to those who console the Virgin Mary through this devotion is the assistance at the hour of death with the graces necessary for their salvation. The Blessed Mother also promised that this devotion will result in the salvation of souls and peace in the world. world.

St. Ignatius of Loyola July 31

St. Ignatius of Loyola July 31

Saint Ignatius of Loyola was born at his family's ancestral castle in Guipúzcoa, Spain in 1491. He was the youngest of 13 children. In his young years, Iñigo, as he was called left home to serve as a page for Juan Valazques, treasurer of the kingdom of Castile. He was frequently at court and developed a taste for the material world. He was also drawn to the military. His skill in diplomacy and his leadership qualities helped him make a name for himself. But during the Battle of Pamplona in 1521, Ignatius of Loyola was horribly injured when a cannonball shattered one of his legs. That CANNONBALL MOMENT, a moment that changed him for the better, was the beginning of his spiritual journey. While he recovered, he read a book about the lives of Jesus and the saints. It compelled him to devote himself to a spiritual life. He entered a period of deep reflection, or discernment, during which he gave his time and thoughts to the following of Christ. In 1522. Ignatius had a newfound zeal to serve God. He retires to a cave near Manresa and lived in austerity and prayer for ten months. This is where he developed the foundation for his Spiritual Exercises. In 1523 Ignatius makes a pilgrimage to the Holy Land and returned to Spain in 1524, and began his education. Ignatius, journeys to France to attend the University of Paris. There he forms a pious fraternity that evolves into the Society of Jesus, or the Jesuits. Members of the Society of Jesus go to Rome, where they receive the approval of Pope Paul III, who confirms their order. In 1541, Ignatius of Loyola is elected the first general of the Society of Jesus. He is the chief administrator of the rapidly growing order, and he devoted his time to writing the Constitutions of the Order and to the completion of his Spiritual Exercises. Ignatius of Loyola died in 1556 in Rome and was canonized in 1662.

St. Alphonsus Liguori August 1st

St. Alphonsus was born in the village of Marianella near Naples, Italy, September 27, 1696. At a tender age his pious mother inspired him with the deepest sentiments of piety. The education he received under the auspices of his father, aided by his own intellect, produced in him such results that at the early age of sixteen, he graduated in law. Shortly after, he was admitted to the Neopolitan bar. In 1723, he lost a case, and God made use of his disappointment to wean his heart from the world. In spite of all opposition he now

bar. In 1723, he lost a case, and God made use of his disappointment to wean his heart from the world. In spite of all opposition he now entered the ecclesiastical state. In 1726, he was ordained a priest. He exercised the ministry at various places with great fruit, zealously laboring for his own sanctification. In 1732, God called him to found the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer, with the object of laboring for the salvation of the most abandoned souls. Amid untold difficulties and innumerable trials, St. Alphonsus succeeded in establishing his Congregation, which became his glory and crown, but also his cross. The holy founder labored incessantly at the work of the missions until, about 1756, he was appointed Bishop of St. Agatha, a diocese he governed until 1775, when broken by age and infirmity, he resigned this office to retire to his convent where he died. Few saints have labored as much, either by word or by writing, as St. Alphonsus. He was a prolific and popular author, the utility of whose works will never cease. His last years were characterized by intense suffering, he became partially paralyzed and bent overwhich he bore with resignation. He spent the last twelve years of his life in his congregation's religious houses, writing, pryaing and suffering. He eventually became blind and deaf but never stopped loving God and serving His will. In his final years, he saw divisions attack his condeaf but never stopped loving God and serving His will. In his final years, he saw divisions attack his congregation, and he himself spent his final three years being tempted with extreme scruples, demonic attacks, and spiritual darkness. All of this only led to his greater sanctity. At times, it's tempting to think that holiness ensures an easy life. On the contrary, the Father often permits great suffering to those who love Him the most in imitation of His divine Son. Though Saint Alphonsus suffered greatly in many different ways, he remained faithful to his heartfelt mission of saving souls. He believed in the mercy of God, brought that mercy and truth to the greatest sinners, and ensured that his mission endured time by founding a religious congregation and leaving behind voluminous writings that are understandable to all. His happy death occurred at Nocera de Pagani, August 1, 1787.

As we honor this holy saint, ponder his central message that God is merciful and welcomes even the greatest sinner. See yourself as that sinner in need of God's mercy, and do not hesitate to run to the Heart of the Most Holy Redeemer to find rest and peace.
